## Sally L. Wallace, CISSP

Sally Wallace assumed her current position as the Associate Deputy Assistant Secretary for Privacy/Records Management on March 3, 2007. In this role, she serves as the Executive in charge of VA's Privacy and Records Management programs, as well as serving as VA's Chief Freedom of Information Officer. Prior to this, she served as the Associate Deputy Assistant Secretary for E-Government, responsible for VA's e-government initiatives as a part of the President's Management Agenda (PMA) while advocating electronic services to veterans and their beneficiaries. She also served as VA's Chief FOIA Officer, and managed VA's Web presence and Privacy programs. From 2003 – 2006, Ms. Wallace served as the Associate Deputy Assistant Secretary for IT Operations.
